

Achievement Award Presented to Borge Olsen

Horse Council BC (HCBC) former board member Barb Schmidt presented the HCBC 2015 Sherman Olson Lifetime Achievement Award to local horseman, Borge Olsen during the 2016 Canada Cup Vaulting Competition at Chilliwack Heritage park on May 28th.

Borge Olsen, who turns 94 this year, is considered to be the "grandfather" of vaulting in Canada. His early efforts to develop the sport are credited with helping to usher this country into the international vaulting arena.

Born in Denmark, Borge earned his trainer's license in that country and then brought his astounding expertise in vaulting and dressage to Canada. He was a national dressage judge in Canada for over 30 years, but it is his significant contribution to the sport of equestrian vaulting that has endeared him to countless athletes, coaches and judges. This year has been particularly meaningful to her. In March of 2015, Stella suffered from a severe colic and underwent surgery to save her life. Natalie cared for her daily during the 90 days of stall rest. Natalie and Stella began to ride together again in June with the guidance of her vets and in August, Stella was given the clear to compete. 

Equine Canada Statement regarding revisions to the NCCP Transfer of Qualifications

To our valued NCCP certified coaches, as you know, in September of 2015 Equine Canada launched the NCCP Transfer of Qualifications program which was aimed at helping coaches certified under the old NCCP levels model transition their certifications to the new NCCP context based model. Over the past seven (7) months Equine Canada and its Provincial and Territorial partners have heard your concerns related to the Transfer of Qualifications and we are announcing that a revised NCCP Transfer of Qualifications was implemented on May 27th, 2016. The revised transfer will be simple, painless and will only require coaches to complete the Making Ethical Decisions (MED) Online Evaluation of your new context within the first five (5) years of the transfer. If you have completed the appropriate MED Online Evaluation already, then your transfer will be complete. (Read more)

Invasive Species of the Month

Invasive Plant Species of the Month honours go to Common Burdock (Arctium minus), considered regionally noxious under the BC Weed Control Act. Common Burdock's fruit, or burrs, are covered with truly tenacious clinging hairs that inspired Swiss engineer Georges de Mestral to invent



the hook and loop fastener commonly known as Velcro™. Common Burdock was introduced to North America in the 1700's for its medicinal properties. Plants grow up to 2 m tall and are identified by erect, coarse stems and large, heart shaped leaves, when mature. Burdock can shade out smaller, native plants. The burrs can affect livestock - heavily burred cattle become stressed and can be injured trying to remove them, sheep fleece can be ruined and occasionally birds and bats become entangled in standing plants and die.

Control means checking your horses' manes and tails, your dogs' coats and your clothing for burrs to avoid carrying them from place to place. Mowing or cutting is best done before flowering to eliminate seed production and the large taproot system growing deep underground requires tilling.

2016 Share The Trails Workshop A Success!



The recent 2016 Share the Trails Workshop was presented by Horse Council BC and the Outdoor Recreation Council of BC, together with the Shuswap Trail Alliance and sponsored by <u>Backroad Map Books</u>. The Share the Trails initiative endeavours to foster positive and effective alliances between diverse trail user groups in the areas of access, safety, maintenance and education.

Held May 6 and 7 in Salmon Arm, the Workshop offered education on cooperating with First Nations; conflict resolution and clear communication; improving marketing communications; examples of successful

collaborations by user groups; volunteerism; raising awareness; and the role of government. Thirty-one participants, representing a wide variety of user groups from around BC, learned more about what can be accomplished with leadership, inclusion, planning and organization. (Read more)

Your Trail of the Month for June is waiting for you in the South Cariboo region!

At 108 Mile Trails, accessed through the Hills Ranch, you'll find corrals constructed by the Back Country Horsemen of BC for all trail riders to use and




enjoy, in the area between the highway and the Hills Ranch buildings. Register for the campsites with corral at Hills Ranch, and show them your HCBC membership card for a 10% discount. There is no charge for day riding and just \$25.00 for overnight. You will also have access to restaurants, lounges, hot tub, pool, and showers. There is no power at the campsites, but there is water for horses and an outhouse. There are about 30 corrals and room for big rigs

Just north of 100 Mile House, the 108 Mile ski trails north of the highway are excellent for horses. No motorized vehicles are allowed on the trails, accessed via The Hills Ranch. Many are groomed trails used in the winter for X-country skiing, and wind along the beautiful rolling hills of Cariboo cattle country.
