REDUCING THE RISK OF EXPOSURE TO CRYSTALLINE SILICA DUST FOR HORSE TRAINERS & RIDING COACHES

Exposure to crystalline silica dust in riding arenas presents health hazards for horse trainers and riding coaches. The attached bulletin explains the hazards, suggests options for preventing worker exposure, and discusses the need for an exposure control plan.

PROPOSED NATIONAL EQUINE INFECTIOUS ANEMIA DISEASE CONTROL PROGRAM

The Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) has launched a 60-day public consultation on a proposed new National Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) Disease Control Program.

The CFIA has been collaborating with provincial, territorial and equine industry representatives, among others, over the past few years to develop a new approach to address program issues. One of the main issues has been the low volume of owner-requested testing (surveillance) among western Canada equine owners, even though many positive cases of EIA have been identified in that area. As a result, a key recommendation from the EIA working group was for the CFIA to develop a program that includes some mandatory EIA testing requirements for certain movements of horses in western Canada.

Stakeholders may comment on the proposed program, including:

- details about zoning Canada for EIA

- the movement control system
- changes to how the CFIA would respond to EIA,
- how the full program would be implemented

If support is received, the CFIA will proceed with planning the implementation of this program.



INVASIVE SPECIES OF THE MONTH

Japanese Beetle (popillia japonica)

The Japanese Beetle, an invasive species with a potentially devastating effect on local agriculture, has been spotted in Vancouver.

First introduced to eastern North America in 1916, the pest has recently been identified in central Vancouver, and CFIA is taking aggressive steps to contain the infestation, including targeted spraying. Beginning on June 4, city workers will be spreading a larvicide to kill root-eating beetle grubs. The larvicide is called Acelepryn and is not harmful to people, pets or other animals, or pollinators like bees and butterflies.

The adult beetle attacks ornamental plants, grasses, fruits, vegetables, nurseries, trees and field crops. While only about 1 cm in length, adults are voracious feeders, skeletonizing leaves and eating flowers and fruit. The larvae feed on the roots of turf and other plants and can seriously damage pastures, lawns, sports fields, golf courses and turf production. Pasture grasses with shallow root systems, such as perennial ryegrass, may be especially vulnerable.



What can landowners and managers do about invasive species?

- 1. Learn about invasive species in your specific region
- 2. Check out the resources available through the Invasive Species Council of BC
- 3. Clean hiking boots, tires, boats and trailers after being outside in an environment to stop invasive species from "hitching a ride" on those surfaces to new locations.
- 4. Don't dump aquariums or live bait into waterways.
- 5. Don't move firewood between locations. Collect it or buy it where you burn it.
- 6. Use soil, hay and fertilizer that is "weed free."
- 7. Report new or expanding invasive species to local authorities.
