
be even better still. I am now on levels 7/8 and am excited to be taking the beginner instructor course next year

Do you love watching horses and observing their behaviour? Do you find yourself wondering sometimes why they do what they do? Ethology is a branch of science that looks at animal behaviour. Equine ethologists are scientists who study horse behaviour using both laboratory and field science methods. Yes—there are people who do this for a living!

Researchers recently made a surprising discovery in the abandoned Chernobyl Exclusion Zone (CEZ) it's now home to endangered wild horses. Using video and photo monitoring technology, they learned that a herd of Przewalski horses are routinely using abandoned structures in the CEZ. The CEZ is located in Ukraine covering an area of approximately 2,600 km2 surrounding the Chernobyl Nuclear Power Plant where radioactive contamination from the 1986 nuclear fallout is highest and public access is restricted. The researchers hope these structures can serve as important places for research and management to obtain population information such as age, sex ratio, population size and genetic structure.

Comparing Wild vs Stabled Horses' Time Budgets



Spending time outdoors observing and learning about horses is an activity many people love.

Do you enjoy watching horses interact? Do you wonder about their behaviour? If you do, being an equine **ethologist** may be a dream job for you.

b Science Talk- ethologist: a person who scientifically studies animal behaviour. Ethologists use both laboratory and field science methods.

One area of research looks at how horses divide their time between the activities that satisfy their four basic needs: food, water, movement and rest. This is referred to as the time budget.

Given what you already know about horses, would you predict the time budgets for wild

horses to be the same or different from the time budgets of stabled horses? In what ways would you expect them to be different? In what ways would you expect them to be the same?

Let's take a look at what equine ethologists have discovered.



Another study compared the behaviour of wild horses with the behaviour of domestic horses. Researchers looked at the time budgets of wild horses vs three different groups of domestic horses. What's a time budget? Find out with Horse Lover's Math's six page worksheet.

INVASIVE SPECIES: WILD SWINE INFILTRATE BC

In the late 1980's and early 1990's, Eurasian wild boar were imported to diversify Canadian livestock production. Since then, escaped animals have proliferated across the country, in some cases mating with escaped domestic swine to create animals simply known as wild pigs. "Wild pigs are so widespread that they are a major challenge to control in Canada and eradication is only possible with a comprehensive plan to deal with this highly efficient invasive species. In Saskatchewan they are already posing significant risks to agriculture and livestock production. Our mapping of their expanding territory shows just how quickly they are spreading. This is a rapidly emerging crisis." - USask's Ryan Brook, lead researcher for the Canadian Wild Pig Project

Within B.C., feral pigs have been reported in low numbers in the Lower Mainland, Vancouver Island, Thompson-Okanagan, Peace, Chilcotin and Kootenay Regions. Feral pigs have not yet established large populations in the province, but their incredible adaptability and reproductive success in other areas would suggest that time is not on our side. In the United States, where wild pigs have been a destructive invasive species for many years. Upwards of \$1 billion is spent yearly to control and eradicate them.

DID YOU KNOW? EQUESTRIAN ROAD SIGNAGE MADE TO ORDER

Any equestrian in British Columbia may ask the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure for warning signage, or enhanced warning signage, on the roads they have to ride on. Certain restrictions apply: MOTI is not able to erect warning signage on numbered highways, or roads not under their jurisdiction. On all other BC roads, you may apply to your local MOTI district or sub-district office to have signage installed or enhanced. The process is simple, and equestrians all over BC are taking advantage of the opportunity to improve safety signage in their areas.

The Ministry of Agriculture is responsible for the production, marketing, processing and merchandising of agricultural products and food, and through its legislation protects 4.6 million hectares of farmland in British Columbia. Because of these responsibilities, the ministry would like to ask for your opinions and ideas about how to better support farmers, encourage farming and keep farmland available for farming.

We need to hear from British Columbians on how best to move forward by asking for your insight and opinions on how we can best:

- Support farmers and ranchers in the ALR to expand and diversify their businesses;
- Help new or young farmers become established on the land and in business; and,
- Ensure there is flexibility for residential options while prioritizing agriculture in the ALR.

Solutions to these challenges are needed now more than ever as farmers face increased risks and unpredictability related to climate change, rising land prices, and pressure to use farm land for non-farm uses. Your ideas are needed so that the agriculture industry in B.C. continues to expand and thrive. Feedback is invited between September 19, 2019 to November 15, 2019 at 4 pm During this time, you can share your feedback in several different ways including:

- Attend an in-person meeting
- Completing the online questionnaire
- Organizations can also make formal submissions that will be posted to the site.

The feedback received will help the Provincial Government encourage farming, protect farmland in B.C. and may determine other potential actions that should be developed or consulted upon.

All comments received online, by mail or email by November 15, 2019, will be reviewed by ministry staff and a 'What We Heard' report will then be compiled and released to the public.








BOOK OF THE MONTH
