









As prey animals, horses can be easily startled. If you meet a horse on the trails, here's what you can do as an ATVer to keep everyone safe:







ATVS

 When approaching a horse from in front, move to the side of the trail and turn off your ATV. Say hello so the horse knows you are a human.





ATVS

 If you're on a hill, move to the low side of the trail. Most predators will try to attack from above so the horse will feel less threatened if you are lower down.





ATVS

 If the horse is frightened, take off your helmet and get off your ATV to show that you're a person and not a predator.





ATVS

 When approaching a horse from behind stop your ATV and say hello. The rider may want to turn to face you to show the horse you're not a threat.





ATVS

 When safe, pass the horse slow and wide, ideally giving 3 meters of space. Horses can kick for self defence. Giving extra space will keep you safe in case the horse kicks.





EQUESTRIANS

- When meeting other trail users steady your mount and exchange greetings.
- Remember that a well-trained horse is essential for safe riding.





LEARN THE SIGNS OF A SCARED HORSE

- Eyes wide
- Nostrils flared may make a loud blowing sound from their nostrils
- Ears rapidly move back and forward
- Head is elevated and neck is braced
