Rules

2024 BC Summer Games Equestrian Competition will be governed by the HCBC Rule Book

ATHLETES

Athlete Age and Description: 13 years to 18 years

A minimum of 13 years of age and a maximum of 18 years of age as of December 31, 2023.

Athlete Eligibility:

- Athletes must reside in the zone for which they are competing
- Athletes must compete at the BC Summer Games with the same horse as they qualified on. Exception: Vaulters.
- Athletes must be members in good standing with Horse Council BC
- Athletes may enter only one Equestrian division at the BC Summer Games, but may qualify in more than one division, or on multiple horses during the qualification period.
- Athletes residing in Zones 1 and 8 may submit results obtained from bordering Alberta or United States sanctioned competitions

Athlete Declarations and Qualifying Period

Athletes must complete and submit one declaration form to be considered for Equestrian Team selection. Completed Declaration forms must be signed and returned to: competition@hcbc.ca

- The Qualifying period runs from January 1 2023 to May 31,2024
- Athletes must submit a minimum of two scores or official results from two different designated, sanctioned competitions or Pony Club event within the qualification period.
- Results must be submitted using the Competition Result Submission Form (Separate submission Forms are to be completed for different Disciplines)
- Athletes may submit as many qualifying scores as they wish.

Maximum Athletes: 48

Wildcards: 16 wildcard spots which will be allocated by the Provincial Advisor for Equestrian.

Team Composition: A minimum of 4 athletes per zone, plus the addition of potential allocated wildcard spots

DIVISIONS AND CATEGORIES:

All events are open to both male and female or non-binary athletes on equal terms

Dressage: First Level

Jumper: 90m

Eventing Derby: 85m (HCBC Pre Novice, EC EV85)

Vaulting: Advanced Walk, Advanced Canter

ZONE SELECTIONS AND REGISTRATION DEADLINE:

- Deadline for filing Athlete Declarations is 4:30 PM May 31, 2024
- Zone and Wild Card Team selection will take place June 3,2024 June 7,2024
- The Assistant Provincial Advisor will advise Discipline Chairs and Head Coaches with a finalized Team selection list June 10, 2024
- The Assistant Provincial Advisor will complete BC Games online registration process for all zone athletes, coaches, grooms, and officials not later than June 15, 2022.

FEES:

Note that fees are assessed for athletes only (coaches, adult supervisors, and officials do not pay this fee). Sports may assess additional fees to cover training, uniforms, qualification event(s), etc. Fees are collected by the sport and paid to the BC Games Society upon invoice after the Games.

The BC Games athlete fee for the 2024 BC Summer Games is \$175.00. Horse Council BC charges athletes a supplementary fee of \$60.00. The total athlete fee to compete in Equestrian at the 2024 BC Summer Games is \$245.00 and is collected by Horse Council BC.

ACCOMMODATION:

It is the BC Games Society policy that all athletes are required to stay in Games accommodation, regardless of where they reside, and that at least one adult of the same gender as the athletes must stay in Games accommodation in a supervisory capacity.

Horse Council BC requires that all adults staying in Games accommodation have completed a criminal record check and have successfully completed Making Ethical Decisions Module and the Equestrian Canada Fostering Healthy Equestrian Environments course.

TRANSPORTATION:

Registered athletes, coaches and officials will be provided reimbursement forms to claim eligible travel expenses. Mileage will be paid at .50 per km

Please contact competition@hcbc.ca for information regarding transportation of horses.

Due to scheduling conflict and time restraints, it is recommended that Equestrian Athletes do not take Games transportation if possible. All Equestrian Athletes must plan to be on the competition grounds in order to receive their horses. If this is not possible athletes must arrange to have someone on the grounds to receive and care for their horse until they arrive.

HORSE TRANSPORTATION

- Mileage will be paid for hauling horses
- Ferry fees will be reimbursed

STABLING AND FEED:

- Feed and hay for horses is the responsibility of the competitors.
- Bedding is provided.
- Stabling is provided free of charge at the Games for Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday nights only.
- Participants requiring additional nights will be accommodated with prior arrangements. All horses must be onsite no later than 4pm July 17th

TACK AND ATTIRE:

Athletes are required to wear properly fitted approved BSI or ASTM protective headgear with safety harness correctly secured at all times while mounted on the competition grounds. **Exception: Vaulters.**

MEDALS:

The Minus-One Rule will be implemented for all sports at the BC Games. This means that when there are four or more competitors or teams, Bronze, Silver, and Gold medals will be awarded; when there are three competitors or teams, Silver and Gold medals will be awarded, when there are two competitors or teams only a Gold medal will be awarded. If there is only one competitor or team, no medals are awarded.

Medals will be awarded to athletes in each event in each division, within the parameters of the BC Games Society Minus-One Rule described above.

Medals will also be awarded to the zone team with the highest aggregate medal count. In order to receive their medal. athletes must be present at the Medal Presentation Ceremony, and appropriately attired in riding or vaulting apparel.

Jumping Medals

Overall points calculation

Overall individual medal points will be calculated as:

 1^{st} place 20 points 2^{nd} place 15 3^{rd} place 10 4^{th} place 8 5^{th} place 6 6^{th} place 4 7^{th} place 2 8^{th} place 1

Overall Zone Medal points will be calculated as:

Number of points earned per Zone athlete divided by number of athletes in the Zone

COACHES:

- 1 Senior Discipline Head Coach and 1 Assistant Coach.
- One Chef de Equipe per Zone (Adult Supervisor)
- If the Zone team includes athletes in three or more disciplines an additional Assistant Coach may be added with the permission of the Provincial Advisor. The Provincial Advisor will request approval from BC Games Society.
- If additional adults are named for the zone (or sport) and they meet the certification requirements of assistant coaches, they should be registered with the role "assistant coach", otherwise they are registered with the role "adult supervisor".
- Wherever possible the coach/assistant coach discipline specialty will reflect the discipline makeup of the zone team.

COACH ELIGIBILITY:

- The role of head coach and assistant coaches at the BC Games includes travelling to and from the Games and acting in a supervisory capacity throughout the Games.
- Each zone is required to have a Chef de Equipe; if there is a second member of the zone coaching staff, they must be registered as an Assistant Coach
- All Senior Discipline Head Coaches must be a minimum of Competition Coach certified or equivalent certification from another coaching organization.
- All Assistant Coaches must be a minimum of Competition Coach certified, or equivalent certification from another coaching organization. or be registered as "in training" with Horse Council BC.
- All Head Coaches and Assistant Coaches must have completed the Make Ethical Decisions online evaluation and any additional training required by BC Summer Games.
- All Head and Assistant Coaches must have completed the EC Fostering Healthy Relationships Course
- Athletes' primary coaches are encouraged to attend the Games as spectators but may not coach their athletes at the competition (Attendance at the Games will be at the expense of the personal non-accredited coach.)
- Only assigned Accredited Head Coaches or Assistant Coaches or Chef de Equipes /Adult Supervisors are permitted to interact with athletes in the competition area including warm-up.

OFFICIALS:

16 Officials are permitted to register as participants Transportation, accommodation, and meals, will be provided for officials.

Barn Supervisor:

Barn Supervisors will be appointed and must stay on site with horses. Barn Supervisor Information Form must be submitted to the Assistant Provincial Advisor. All Barn Supervisors will be required to take the Make Ethical Decisions online evaluation and any additional training required by BC Summer Games

DISCIPLINE QUALIFYING CRITERIA and SPECIFICATIONS:

Dressage:

(Ring Size 20m x 60m)

- Dressage rider/horse combinations who have competed at the third level or higher at a sanctioned competition in 2023 or 2024 are not eligible to compete at the BC Summer Games in Dressage.
- Current EC First Level Test 2 and First Level Test 3 Dressage Tests and Rising Stars Equitation scoring will be used
- USDF Level 1 Freestyle
- Callers not allowed
- Whips not allowed

Dressage:

Athletes must submit scores from a minimum of:

- One (1) Freestyle test,
- Two (2) First Level Test 3 Technical tests with a minimum score of 55%
- One (1) Score from a Rising Stars Equitation test

Dressage Schedule

- Current EC First level Test 2 Technical

Day 3

- Current USDF Level 1 Freestyle
- **Dressage Seat Equitation Ride Off:** top 5 scores from day 1 and day 2 and Freestyle combined to ride off. Riders may be asked to show working, collected and extended gaits. The Judge may ask riders to perform individual tests or movements relevant to First Level.

Eventing:

- Any rider/horse combinations who have competed at Training level or above at a sanctioned competition in 2023 or 2024 are not eligible to compete
- Athletes must submit official completion results achieved from (must include dressage phase and cross-country/Derby phase) Eventing Entry 85m level from a minimum of two (2) different BC Eventing, Equestrian Canada, Pony Club or HCBC sanctioned Derby competitions
- 2 Phase competitions, must be at appropriate Entry level (EV85 or HCBC Pre-Novice 85)
- Scoring as per HCBC Derby Rules
- Dressage Phase: Arena size 20 x 40m
- Tests may be called, athletes are to arrange for a caller
- Whips may be carried but must not exceed 120 cm for horses and 100 cm for ponies
- EC EV 85 Dressage Tests to be used
- Specifications for Derby Phase and Show Jumping Phase as per HCBC Eventing Derby Rules

- Dressage Phase (Arena: 20 x 40)
- EV 85 Test 2

• HCBC Pre Novice 85 Eventing Derby Phase

Day 3

• .85m Show Jumping Phase

Jumper

- Any rider/horse combinations who have competed at a sanctioned competition in 2023 or 2024 in a class with specifications above 1.10m in height are not eligible to compete
- Athletes must submit an Athlete Declaration Form with official class results from a minimum of two different approved competitions from any class at the .90m ,1.0m or 1.10m height specification.
- Points will be awarded for results submitted based on athlete's placing and the number of horses that competed in the qualifying class.
- Riders at the Games will also be judged on an Equitation Flat and Gymnastics Phase.
- **Equitation Flat Phase:** will show at the working walk, the working trot sitting, the working trot rising and the working trot showing a lengthening of stride, the working canter and the working canter showing a lengthening of stride.

- **Gymnastics Phase:** This phase is to be judged over a series of gymnastic exercises with a height of .85m .90m maximum
- Riders will be provided with a detailed diagram showing the distance and gait at which each is exercise is to be ridden.
- In these exercises, each rider will be judged on how the rider manages their horse
- Coaches will walk the course with the riders before the class.
- **Final Ride Off: (**Top 5 highest scoring riders with the highest accumulation of points from the three days of competition) Riders to enter the ring together to show walk trot and canter. At the judge's discretion riders may be asked to perform individual tests that may include a change of lead, either simple or flying, a trot jump and may be asked to perform a shortened course of up to four jumps to a maximum of .90m in height

.90m Welcome Jumper

• This is a Competition against the clock, but in the event of equality of penalties for first place, there will be one jump-off against the clock. Other Athletes are placed according to their penalties and time in the first round. Riders will also be scored on their Equitation

.90m Jumper: Match the Clock:

• Competitors with equal faults will be placed according to how close their time is to the optimum time, which is based on the course being ridden at the posted speed. There will be no jump off. Riders will also be scored on their Equitation

BC Summer Games .90 Mini Prix

A competition in two rounds with a jump off. Starting order for the second round will be the reverse order of penalties and time in the first round. Penalties from round one and round two will be added together. In the event of equality of penalties for first place, there will be a jump off against the clock. Other competitors are placed according to their penalties over two rounds and their time from the first round.

Vaulting

Vaulters require two scores in Advanced Canter from two different HCBC, BC Summer Games Qualifying competitions. One score may be from a video class from an HCBC sanctioned, BC Summer Games Qualifying competition.
